Scott Walroth, Region 6 Art Educator of the Year

Scott Walroth, Region 6 Art Educator of the Year, is also one of this year's featured presenters at the 2013 NYSATA Pre-Conference: Innovation & Advocacy in Action. He is no stranger to this arena having previously presented at NYSATA Conferences in the past as well as NYSC&TE Annual Regional Conferences. Scott's topics consistently not only advocate for the arts but demonstrate how new technologies can be used a valuable tools of instruction in the arts.

"The words- 'What's best for kids?' - will always be remembered being spoken by the K-12 Director of Art Education (and my mentor), Scott Walroth". This is a quote by colleague Stephen Honicki, the Nisk-Art Gallery Co-Advisor, evidencing that clearly Scott is ,above all, a student advocate. The student-run Nisk-Art Gallery is only one such student based initiative that Scott created in his school district . A state-of-the-art Electronics Arts Lab offers students Media Arts opportunities further enriching their Visual Arts experience ; another incredible opportunity for students created by Scott. Of the many rewards his students have received, eight of them have been Congressional art awards; several others have been on the local, state, and national levels.

Scott extended his initiatives beyond his school district as a member of CAAS to assist in creating opportunities to a larger number of students. Assisting with the Bi-Annual Art College and Career Night for Capital Area students is one such opportunity as well as the Empire State Plaza Collection Show. These two represent only a small few of many examples.

"Home" a thematic exhibition of work was a recent showing of professional art work by Mr. Walroth at the Nisk-Art Gallery (2012). Obviously advocating for himself as an artist is also another facet of his person.

I have presented only a snapshot of an amazing art educator of 31 years. He has taught middle and high school, Advanced, AP, Honors Art Studio, Photography, Cinematography, Ceramics, Sculpture, and Studio in Computer Arts. Scott Walroth is a strong, knowledgeable ,powerful advocate for Art Education as a Profession, for Students of Art Education, and Art Education of the Future. Member Spotlight - Getting to know Krista Gillis, owner of Capital Region Teachers for Teachers

Krista Gillis is a Region 6 NYSATA member who has recently opened a new business that focuses on professional development opportunities. Her business, Capital Region Teachers for Teachers, is currently offering several workshops for art teachers and new courses are being added regularly. I recently chatted with Krista to find out more about her business and her background. Here's the results of that chat:

Tell us about why you decided to open Capital Region Teachers for Teacher.

As an art teacher myself, I found that I was becoming more and more disappointed and frustrated with the professional development that was available to me. The state is requiring more hours of professional development for new generations of teachers than ever before but districts are being forced to cut back on their professional development funds and resources, Teacher Centers are closing, and museums have had cutbacks too. Many of us are paying out of pocket for our classes or driving great distances to find a course applicable to our field. I decided it was time to take matters into my own hands and try a new approach.

And, what is that approach?

I can't state it more directly than the company name itself; Teachers for Teachers. We are all trained professionals and many of us artisans as well. Why not pass our knowledge to each other like we do every day with our own students. The mission is to create relevant and affordable development opportunities by relying on our greatest strength- our collective knowledge.

What kind of experience do you have in the world of professional development?

During my time as a grad assistant for the Art Education department at Naz-

areth College, one of my responsibilities was to help run a program called the Mentor Network. Capital Region Teachers for Teachers is based loosely on this program which also relied on teachers coming together for workshops and art experiences. My job taught me how to plan, market, register, and run an event. Eventually I took these skills and started teaching my own children's classes in the Rochester area. I also worked part-time for several years in the Creative Workshop at the Memorial Art Gallery. My responsibilities here were similar to that of the Mentor Network, although I worked as part of a much greater team.

How does your own classroom experience add to this?

I've been working in the teaching field for about ten years. In that time I have worked in mainly rural and suburban districts in the Rochester and Albany areas. I have, in this relatively short amount of time, had the opportunity to work with children in every grade level from K-12. I have taught kindergarten art, digital photography, art history, ceramics, photography, middle school digital art, and the list goes on and on. I have learned many things from these experiences but mainly that I LOVE to learn, that teaching is all about flexibility, and that I'm not afraid of a challenge. These experiences have really empowered me to want to learn more, reflect on my own practices and share where I can.

What kind of courses are your offering through your business?

Anything and everything I can: art making, technique driven, Common Core related, the integration of technology, and so on. I am willing to consider any topic as long as there is an interest from local teachers. In the future I'd love to offer some bus trips to museums as well.

Who teaches the classes?

I intend to teach some myself but any teacher can approach me with an idea. You have to have a solid idea and obviously the credentials to back it up. I'd also like to get

some local artisans to teach workshops on their own area of expertise. Once we have an idea in place, I can hire you as an independent contractor to teach your course and be paid for it. I can also help you to earn professional development hours by teaching the course. This is a general outline of course; more details of the process can be found on the proposals page of my website or through speaking with me directly.

And do I get credit for taking your courses?

Of course! Just like any workshop you attend you will receive an attendance certificate for your time in class that you can present to your district for PDP hours.

Let's hear more about your website.

It's capitalregionteachers.com. Since I am an independent business I have my own site that features our course listings, event calendar and shopping cart system. Once a visitor has registered for an account they will be able to view their upcoming and past classes, print/view receipts, and eventually print their attendance certificates- right now they are emailed to you once your class is complete. You can add a course to our shopping cart and either pay by personal credit card on a secure third party system or submit a request for a purchase order. And don't forget to find us on Facebook and Pinterest too!

Anything else you would like us to know?

I hope that you all remember that I have been in your shoes and understand the rigors of our field. I am passionate about learning and I truly do want the courses I'm offering to help make your job a little easier. I'm always open to ideas, opinions, and feedback, so don't hesitate to drop me an email or give me a call. So far I've been thrilled by the enthusiasm and support of my fellow colleagues and hope that we can all work together to continue to create a wonderful sharing community.

This past November 2012 President Obama visited Myanmar for the purpose of expanding the tie between the United States and the people of Myanmar. As Myanmar embarks on a Democratic transition, and embraces the West, the once secluded country welcomes the opportunity to meet with their professional counterparts. In an effort to build upon the groundwork established by this historic visit, his Excellency U Than Swe, Ambassador to the United States from Republic of the Union of Myanmar invites The National Art Education Association to be a part of the US Education Initiative to Myanmar in November 2013.

The delegation will focus on the following:

- Establishing and applying educational policy, both on national and local levels;
- Curriculum, planning, including selecting content and establishing standards for teachers and learners;
- Teaching environments, including the makeup of daily schedules, both in rural and urban settings;
- Assessment of teaching and learning, and how specialized or magnet 'type' schools may inform decisions about assessment;
- Teacher preparation - how training methods differ between teachers in traditional school settings and those in alternative learning environments;
- Teaching artists
- The influences of local art and culture
- Community perceptions about art in schools

After 37 years of teaching in Illinois and New York State, Sandra desired to be a part of global education. She is excited to represent Queensbury, New York State and the United States in this historic event.


